



Now that we are over 45 years old and are quickly approaching our 50th anniversary, we want to ensure the sustainability of this grass-roots efforts by alumni and friends to help students directly. The majority of our current donor base is between the ages of 65 and 85 years old. Younger alumni and recipients of the scholarships are being asked to step up but this will take considerable time. There is a solution. Due to the unexpected generosity of one of our donor's children'. Their son has given us \$25,000 with a "Matching Gift" request to launch an Endowment.

When the Wildcat Club was established in 1973 the focus was sports because the student athletes needed things like equipment, uniforms, and transportation to and from away games. By the year 2000, VU had grown to a point where the Wildcat Club was replaced by professional fundraisers and the University decided that the WCC was longer needed to help the student athletes.

Over the intervening years, the school has become wildly successful, winning the NCAA Men's Basketball Championships both in 2016 and 2018, generating millions of dollars from merchandising and television licensing fees. Hurray! We have a wonderful windfall for our sports programs, including more money for athletic scholarships. What a great job Coach Wright has done!

And what a fantastic job BWSF donors have done in continuing to help students where they had a need. Since the Wildcat Club changed it's name and its purpose to The Blue White Scholarship Foundation, you have all supported "Needs based" Scholarships. As the focus of all major Universities shifts from "Needs Based" to other politically correct criteria, there is a real danger that mainstream students will be left out of badly needed scholarships. Blue White is here to "Bridge That Gap".

There are two main criteria for a Blue White Scholarship Foundation. First – is the student "Working his/her Way through School" doing what they can to pay for their own expenses, and do they have an "Unmet Financial Need." All other issues aside, the question of unmet financial need is the main focus of our criteria for awarding scholarships.

So, what do we mean by "Unmet" financial need? This means that, although a student may have been awarded tuition grants by the University, or other financial aid in the form of state and federal or private scholarships, including the maximum amount of private and government loans, are they still short the money they need to pay for their tuition and room and board expenses? This is their unmet need.

After the University has done all they deem appropriate to assist the student, we are here as a safety net. The alumni that have provided this safety net through the BWSF for nearly the past twenty years, are the most selfless and giving of people. I cannot give you enough accolades.

No perks have been had by BWSF donors. No tickets, no free entertainment, no name on a building. Instead you have been asked to work and get involved by becoming a Judge and evaluating the student applications. This input determines which students are recommended to receive scholarship awards. How much of a scholarship each student receives is then determined by the BWSF Scholarship Committee after reviewing information provided by the V.U. Financial Assistance Department.



How My Father's Accident Changed My Life -Kristina Day



Life can change in an instant. Seven years ago, on an ordinary Tuesday morning in January, my dad experienced just how true this sentiment is. As the crashing of metal on metal echoed through the air, life as my dad

knew it came to a screeching halt. In the blink of an eye, my dad became the victim of a traumatic brain injury.

Life for my family became divided between preaccident and post-accident as my dad battled-and still battles his traumatic brain injury. Pre-accident, my dad was the senior vice president of sales for a large and successful

company; post-accident, my dad is unable to return to work of any kind. Pre-accident, my family of six (and two dogs) lived in my beautiful childhood home; post-accident, all eight of us had to move into a two bedroom apartment. Pre-accident, life was simple; post-accident, life was unpredictable. In a moment, our finances became unstable and the future became uncertain. Life changed in an instant. But, the way I see it, you can let that change hold you back from achieving your dreams, or you can use it to push you forward. And that is exactly what I did.

My dad was, for lack of a better word, just a normal guy. He coached my sisters' and my softball team, he was the grill-master at any and all family barbecues, he went all out decorating for Halloween and Christmas, he was your stereotypical father. How then could this one impact have such detrimental effects?

How then could this accident completely change him and his life?

I craved the answers to these questions, and that's how I stumbled upon the field of neuroscience. Neuroscience—the study of the brain—seeks to answer



those questions and more, putting together the puzzle of how a three-pound organ in our head creates every aspect of ourselves and our lives. But perhaps most importantly, neuroscience shows us that we aren't all that different from one another; though we may look different, though we may lead different lives, we all have the same four lobes in our brain defining who we are.

This past summer, I had the incredible opportunity to work at a rehab center doing physical and cognitive therapy for traumatic brain injury survivors. Whether working out in the exercise program, painting in the art therapy program, or drumming in the music therapy program, these tremendously strong survivors refuse to be defined by their circumstances. Each and every day, they come in with a smile on their faces and push themselves to be better than they were the day before. They may have had a stroke or a seizure or a TBI, but that does not define them; these men and women are college graduates,, movie directors, PhD recipients, teachers, (businessmen like my dad), they are not their injury and they are not their circumstances.

Growing up, my dad always told me "you can do anything you set your mind to". Inspired by the strength I saw in my dad following his accident, I knew I couldn't let my circumstances or my life changes define me. So I graduated high school, started college at Villanova with a major in Cognitive and Behavioral Neuroscience and a minor in Global Health, and have set my mind to an incredible dream: Getting my Masters degree in Public Health. My father's accident changed my life, but maybe someday I will change the world!

Student Spotlight Kellan Short '20 Mathematics





math major, and I hope to share my experiences with them. It is rewarding to feel like I have influenced someone in the same way Dr. Ashley influenced me.



February Donor of the Month— Dr. Chris Gostout '72 Thank you Chris for Participating in the Monthly Giving Program



From the Villanova Main Line to the Wilds of Minnesota's North Country -

Why so? The answer is as clear as a mid-winter morning- cold and snow. Lots of it. This was a daydream '72 Villanova A&S Biology major Chris Gostout had as he looked out from a hallway window in

Saint Mary's Hospital, Mayo Clinic, one summer day while he was a visiting medical student sub-intern in the mid 70's. And here is how this story unfolds.

The now semi-retired gastroenterologist from the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota grew up on Staten Island, where he attended Monsignor Farrell High School for boys, a brand new school graduating its first class when he was a freshman. As far back as he could remember, he wanted to be a physician and loved the winter. After attending a student candidate parent weekend pre-med presentation in Mendel Hall by the late Dr. Horowitz, Villanova appealed to him as offering an opportunity to allow his aspirations to come true and enter medical school.

After four years of a valuable Villanova education and more than memorable personal experiences, a transition was made to the SUNY Downstate Medical Center at Kings County Hospital, Brooklyn. This medical school was strongly recommended by Villanova microbiology professor, the late Dr. Way, and turned out to a perfect choice, having offered an incredible education and clinical experience. After "Downstate" and that summer Mayo Clinic sub-internship, our Villanova graduate returned to the Mayo Clinic in 1976 for a residency in Internal Medicine and subsequent fellowship in Gastroenterolgy.


During his subsequent 33 year full time career at Mayo, Dr. Gostout became a world recognized expert in interventional endoscopy, inventor of new minimally invasive tools and procedures, and President of the American Society for Gastrointestinal Endoscopy.

But what does this have to do with cold and snow? The medical student daydream was a vision of the northern wilderness area of Minnesota, referred to as the Boundary Waters Wilderness Canoe Area (BWCA)



which he had heard so much about as an outdoor temple of tranquility, nature, and abundant wildlife, but not the

summertime canoeist and fisherman's paradise.




It was the silent pristine beauty of the winter scape that was alluring to him. Dr. Gostout did enjoy visiting the BWCA in the summer for weeks at a time with his wife, Bobbie, but winter was a

special time of the year. He became a cross-country ski enthusiast.

His love of the North country led to acquiring lakeside property along the edge of the BWCA, 400 miles from the family home in Rochester, secluded, and off the grid. In the winter he can be found there only by his tracks, both ski and snow shoe, leading from his cabin for miles and hours deep into the forests where he has observed moose, cougar, and wolves in the otherwise silent beauty of the winter snow. One of the most favorite images in is mind's eye is of the snow covering the deeply frozen lake, sparkling in the mid-morning sun. These are common to him while relaxing at the end of the day in his wood-fired sauna.

Chris lives in the country outside of Rochester where he maintains and grooms 6 miles of private cross country ski trails. His wife, Bobbie, is from Rollingstone, Minnesota, a gynecologic oncology surgeon and one of Mayo Clinic's Vice Presidents. They have three sons.

When Bob and Traudi Thomason's youngest daughter left for college, the empty nesters were faced with a decision: either remain in their Wayne home or downsize. Then there was the actual size of their nest: a five-bedroom Victorian Arts & Crafts estate from the 1890s.

No doubt, it was too much house for two people—and that gave Traudi an idea. "A B&B seemed like the perfect way to repurpose," she says.

Once the couple began to seriously consider the prospect, they realized that the odds were in their favor. The home is on Strafford Avenue, a short walk from downtown Wayne's many restaurants and shops, not to mention the train station. And a pool on the one-acre property would be an nice bonus for guests in the summer months.

Inside, the layout lent itself perfectly to operating an inn, from the spacious formal living areas on the first floor to the five bedrooms—all with en-suite bath-

rooms—on the second and third floors.

The Thomasons could also bill their venture the first B&B on the proper Main Line—not a bad selling point. "Everyone assumes I had a life-long desire to open a bed and breakfast, which isn't the case," Traudi says. "We lived here for 10 years before it even crossed my mind."

It took three long years to get all the zoning permits and paperwork finalized for the Wayne Bed & Breakfast Inn. "When everything was approved, it was a great feeling because it was real," says Traudi. "We just needed people to want to stay."

In the family room/great room, the owners refinished the extensive cherry woodwork and added beautiful floral William Morris reproduction wallpaper authentic to the home's era. "I have an eclectic style," says Traudi, as she points to the abstract paintings hanging in the room. "I like to mix antiques with modern pieces."

The roomy kitchen's modern amenities are now necessities, and an adjoining sunroom doubles as an office. "I like to spend a lot of time there because it's almost like being outside," says Traudi.



original is the oval crystal chandelier hanging above the antique dining set. "I wasn't sure how people would feel sitting at the same table having breakfast together, but they seem to love it," she says.

Elsewhere, bedrooms once claimed by their daughters are now comfortable accommodations for visitors. But perhaps the biggest transition for the Thomasons was moving their personal living quarters to what is essentially an in-law suite. "We truly lived in every room," says Traudi. "We had to reorganize everything. We were downsizing, but staying in the same home."

Running a B&B is a major lifestyle change for the couple—one they've had no choice but to fully embrace. In the first six months, and they've already hosted visitors from 22 states and around the world. Among the highlights — a WWF female wrestler and a Canadian artist turned paleontologist after being asked to reconstruct missing dinosaur bones early in his career.




