Executive Director's "Giving Thanks" and Doing Good!

I would be remiss with an older donor base if I did not mention that we are very appreciative of those of you who are able to make larger contributions. We encourage GIFTS IN YOUR WILLS and the following:

DONATING IRA ASSETS The IRS mandates that individuals 70 1/2 and older take required minimum distributions (RMD) from their IRA each year. Failure to do so is a 50% penalty!!!!!! By making a charitable contribution from your IRA in the full or partial amount, you can satisfy your RMD amount without reporting additional income, thereby lowering your tax bill and enjoy giving to BWSF.

DONATING SECURITIES Giving stock held a minimum of 1 year is savvier than giving cash. First, avoid paying any capital gains on the increase in value of the stock. Second, receive an income tax deduction for the full Fair Market Value of the stock at the time of the gift. The process is simple. Student Spotlight: On Biomedicine

Greg Branigan Received a Fellowship Travel Grant to present his research. Greg hopes to find a cure for neurodevelopmental diseases such as Alzheimer's Parkinson's and MS.

I am currently studying biochemistry and molecular biology at Villanova. Following graduation in May, I hope to enter a MD/PHD program in the fall. I am interested in translational biomedical research, specifically neurogenesis disease and neurodevelopmental diseases such as Alzheimer's, Parkinson, MS, and hydrocephalus. There is a new program that is funded by the NIH and it's a great opportunity for people who are into both the research and medicine. For me, it's an amazing continuation of this Villanova education where we are taught unitas, veritas, and caritas (truth, unity, and love). In medicine there is a great understanding of the community you need both within the medical practitioners and the families they work with. With research and academia we are looking for truth and that is both shared, as an undergrad biochemistry




major as well as what will be the medical curriculum. And finally, caritas love. You want people that really care about you, that will go the extra mile, and who are genuine to be these medical practitioners. For me, what I learned at Villanova is an amazing preparation for medical school that will really help me to excel in the field that I go into.

Thanks to support from the Department of Biology, the Villanova Undergraduate Research Fellowship Travel grant, and the Dennis M Cook Gregor Mendel Endowed Chair in Genetics Fellowships, I was able to attend the Society for Developmental Biology and International Society for Differentiation joint meeting in Bos-

ton, MA in August of 2016. At the conference I presented my work in developmental biology and neurosci-

ence that I had completed throughout the summer. I study neurological development using zebrafish as a model organism for human development to ask questions at the biochemical and molecular level. At the conference I attended a variety of presentations focusing on developmental biology, novel model systems of development, epigenetics, differentiation, and current topics in stem cell research to name a few. Each night, I attended poster presentations and networked with other scientists from across the globe. A majority of other attending scientists were from leading institutions such as Harvard, Yale, and Cambridge University. On the penultimate night of the conference, I presented my work entitled "Brd2"



paralogs may act antagonistically in the development of the central nervous, circulatory, and digestive systems." As first author on the poster and upcoming paper, I along with the other members of the lab represented Villanova at the international level. The conference was a tremendous success and we returned with a variety of new tools and techniques which will be incorporated into our research this semester. Throughout the fall and spring semesters this year I will be continuing my research in the DiBenedetto lab and will be completing an undergraduate thesis in biology as part of my Biochemistry major.

Student Spotlight: On Journalism

This past summer BWSF Scholar Marie Bouffard worked as a Residential Educator

I am interested in journalism and science and teaching so I combined these skills and worked as a Residential Educator for FONZ (Friends for the National Zoo). Here is my story:

As a resident educator I served as camp-counselor for the overnight camp and also as a teacher. The kids ranged in age from going into fifth grade to going into tenth grade so we developed lesson plans for our classes that could be scaled for every age group. I created a lesson on sustainable food systems which looked at where our food comes from, how it's grown, how we use technology in the agriculture process, and how agriculture interacts and impacts the environment. In class we traced on maps where in the world out favorite foods come from and discussed the pros and cons of eating local, had insightful discussions on the role of technology has in growing our food, looked at the ways agriculture can harm our environment and the exciting ways farmers have developed to work with nature to grow food, and foraged for native edible plants. This class was directly inspired by my education in sustainability at Villanova



and particularly a class on sustainable agriculture taught by Dr. Chara Armon which has had a huge impact on my studies.

The directors asked me to teach a class on science writing since that is what I am aiming to do with my education and because they'd never had anything of the sort before. At first I was hesitant as to



how I would make a class on science writing fun for middle schoolers and high schoolers, (especially since there were very few ideas on the internet!) but it turned out extremely well! When kids first got their class assignments there was some groaning about hating writing but inevitably afterward they each admitted to me that it turned out to be their favorite class of the entire camp! I began the lesson by discussing the two different types of science writing, writing for scientific research journals vs. writing for a science magazine. The kids sorted characteristics on slips of paper into a Venn diagram (made of two hula-hoops) of each type of writing. We then played a game I made up where the kids split into teams where each had a role, scientist, journalist, and artist, where the artist had to draw the

"newly discovered organism" I had created based only on the descriptions they received from the 'journalist' who heard from the 'scientist', the only team member to actually see the organism.


The camp was located at the Smithsonian Conservation Biology Institute, a satellite campus of the Smithsonian National Zoo located in Northern Virginia where some of the most endangered animals live for breeding and research purposes. SCBI is a magical place, gorgeous landscapes filled with research plots, fascinating people, and of course, endangered animals like kiwis, scimitar-horned oryx, cheetahs, przewalski's horses, red pandas, clouded leopards, and more. Living at SCBI we got to interact with the



zookeepers, researchers, zoo veterinarians, and interns and learn about all the interesting research going on. I was so excited by all the resources at SCBI that I incorporated as much as I could into my lessons. During my sustainable food systems class I took the kids on a driving tour of campus to see some of the related research plots. Seeing research being done on forest biodiversity, invasive plant control, healthy grassland research, and an active apiary, definitely drove home the concepts of healthy and integrated ecosystems that we'd been discussing in class. Then, in my science writing class I taught the kids a lesson on 'the art of the interview' and then brought in a zoo vet who was happy to answer all their questions. It was super interesting for me to hear about his work and extremely exciting for the kids, many of them listed it as their favorite class of camp!

Where Are They Now?

Whether entering their careers or areas of higher study, our students are some of the best representatives of Villanova University. Investing in Blue White Scholars is truly a wise investment. Brian Murray, Class of 2008


Dena Vallano, Class of 2003


DECEMBER: Aileen Cordaro
