Our Fiscal Year 2018-2019 ended on May 31st, and we are pleased to report the following:

- **Total Contributions and other income increased by approximately 15% this past year;**
- **This continues the trend of the previous three years, averaging a 16% increase in contributions in each year since 2014.**

Our scholarship awards have increased by five hundred percent since 2014, and we are awarding scholarships to twenty-four students this year, as opposed to four students in 2014. Sadly, the total unmet need of all the successful applicants for the coming year is still in excess of \$500,000 leaving a gap in the unmet financial need of these students of nearly \$400,000. As a result, BWSF continues to be a vital lifeline to these students. Thanks to all of you for your loyal support of our mission to “Bridge the Gap”.

Donations to the Foundation continue to increase because of your generosity, and expenses for the scholarship program continue to decline. We able to do this by leveraging technology, and by keeping our administrative expenses to a bare minimum. Most of you should have received a letter from scholarship recipients, describing just how vital the BWSF scholarship is in mitigating the amount of “Unmet Need” that they have to contend with. Unfortunately, the latest figures provided by US News & World Report indicate that Villanova University continues to go in the wrong direction in reducing the amount of unmet financial need in its student body : **Villanova is now showing that unmet need is fully covered for only 13.2% of its financially challenged students, a decline of nearly 20% since last year.** (See the Graph below) **Compare that number to Georgetown University and Boston College; both of which cover 100% of their students’ Unmet Need.** Thanks to all of you, there are people who understand their plight. Many of you now give 4 times a year when you receive the Newsletter and others have offered to become Sponsors; still others have donated valuable auction items, bought Mother’s Day Raffle tickets, and attended events. You are making a difference, and it shows in our numbers. Have a great Summer!

June Acts of Kindness – Connor Bradley '19



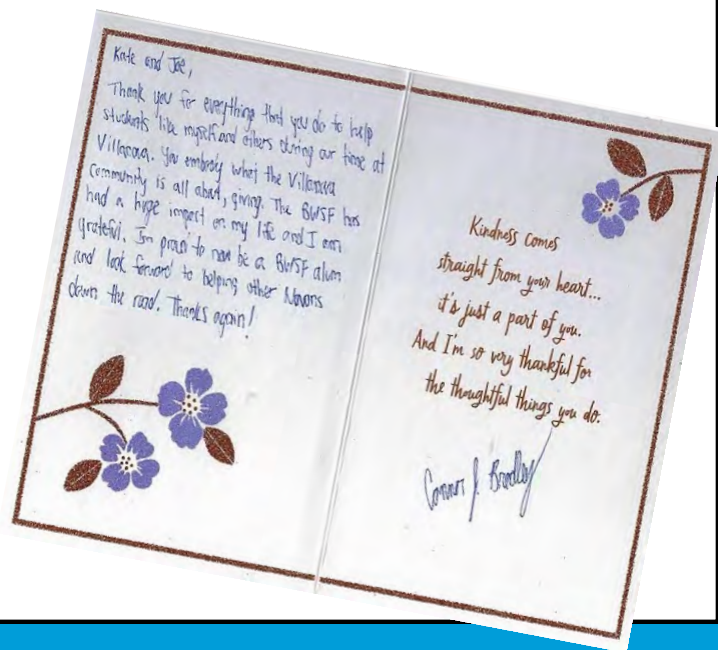

Student Thank You by Camille Smith '20

Since a young age, I've wanted to be a doctor. My parents always told me about how I would run around trying to "fix" people with band-aids as early as 5-years-old if they were hurt. Although, no one knew where I had gotten it from, I was fixated on becoming a doctor.

Throughout grade school, I always favored science whether that be the environment, biology, chemistry, etc. In fifth grade, we began separating out science. I feel that fifth grade was a very important year for me because it solidified my prior interest in science. My elementary school went up to 6th grade, so prior to going to middle school, students were required to take placement tests for each subject. I placed into all honors except for science. Although I was bummed, I hoped that I would do well that year, so I could potentially be recommended for Honors Science the following year.

In seventh grade, my teacher would often hand out science current events about various topics. **One article changed my life. The article was about neuroplasticity. A story of a little boy's brain not functioning properly, but due to "neuroplasticity" he relearned how to do things.** This was a revolutionary moment for two reasons: one, I had never thought about someone's brain not working, and two, that article laid the foundation for a passion that I continue to kindle today. I became obsessed with this concept and began researching it constantly. **One thing led to another and by the end of the week, I knew neuroscience was the study of the nervous system composed of the**

brain, brain stem, and nerves, and that the brain was about the size of two fists held together ,yet it controlled the entirety of the body, and the condition the boy had was not that uncommon. I was even more engaged with science than before, but at the end of the year, I still didn't get a recommendation for honors. However, although my teacher didn't give me a recommendation, my dad overrode his decision and put

me in honors. In eighth grade, I struggled in honors science all year, but consistently went to office hours and tried my best. By the end of the year, I had a "B-", but my teacher still gave me a recommendation for honors sci-

ence going into high school. I was ecstatic because this was the first time that my teacher believed in me enough to recommend me for honors in science. In high school, I embarked on my honors science track, and I never looked back. I began in Honors Biology. I dissected worms, frogs, and pigs. I continued to Honors Chemistry in tenth grade. Tenth grade, again, was a turning point for me because chemistry challenged me. I was blessed to have an amazing teacher that spent the extra time with me after class to explain things to me. Once, I started to understand chemistry I started to love it. In eleventh grade, I took Honors Anatomy and Physiology and taking that course reinforced my love of medicine. In this course, we dissected a cat . During my twelfth year, I took three science courses: Honors Physics, AP Psychology, and AP Chemistry.



.As I began to look towards college, I looked back over my past. I have always wanted to be a doctor, I fell in love with neuroscience, I fell in love with chemistry, and I fell in love with Anatomy and Physiology. Looking through the topics I found interest in and the topics I had yet to learn about I decided to major in Chemical Engineering. Chemical Engineering would allow me to learn how to problem-solve, learn how to look at processes, and differentiate me from the applicant pool when applying for medical school.

During my time at Villanova, I have truly enjoyed my time as a student. Although at times Chemical Engineering has been very difficult, I believe that it has built my character both in and outside the classroom. The summer after my freshman year, I got an internship at Janssen Pharmaceutical as an Advanced Technology Intern working in a sub group in the supply chain. My group and I functioned as a support group for the manufacturing of small molecule drugs (pills).

I absolutely loved being able to see what a Chemical Engineer can do in a work setting. This past summer, I got another internship at Janssen Pharmaceutical again in a different role. I worked mainly with large molecule, specifically growing cells.

Chemical Engineering like honors science, chemistry, and anatomy and physiology has been a pivotal point in my journey in science and I cannot wait to see where the rest of the journey takes me.

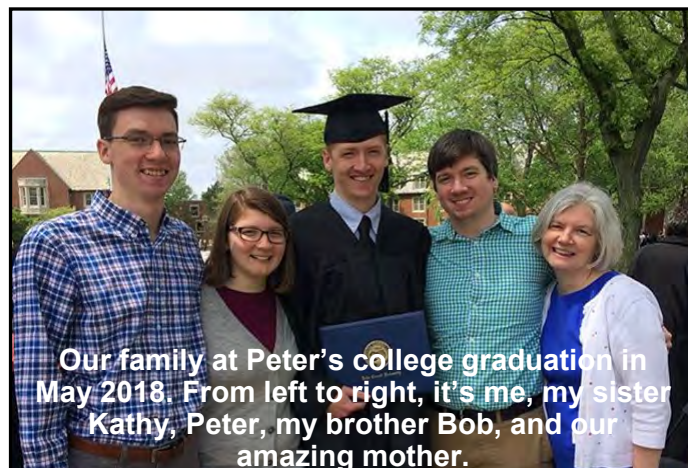
overstate how grateful I am for your contribution.

I have chosen not to return as an RA, but I will be working more hours in the Dining Services office and doing more tutoring. Please write an essay describing factors that have significantly impacted you and your family's financial situation.

"I believe there are people with much more extraordinary circumstances than me, but none the less ... in 2008 my parents were greatly affected by the national financial crisis, and lost a lot of money in the housing market crash. Although they do not talk to us about their financial issues, they did share with us that there was no more money for college tuition. We ended up selling the home we lived in, in a short sale and moved into a much smaller home. My Mother is an elementary school nurse and my Father does cat scans at a local hospital. They have taken on extra jobs to make ends meet. Our school loans are at a higher interest rate due to lower credit score difficulty. My two brothers and I

are all in college full time and our student loans will exceed one hundred thousand dollars."

Here are Rich's credentials:

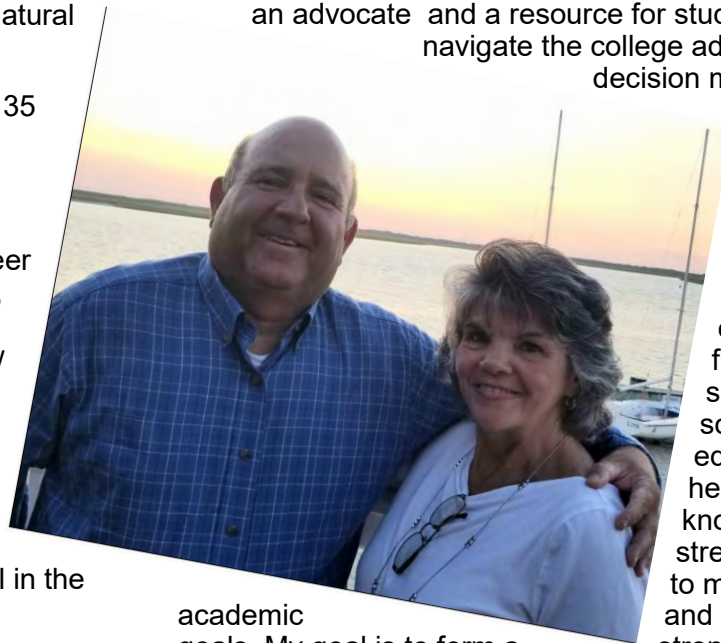
- Educational Specialist degree (ED.S) in Counseling

“I pride myself on helping students transition with confidence from secondary school to higher education, and helping them know all their strengths in order to maximize their and personal

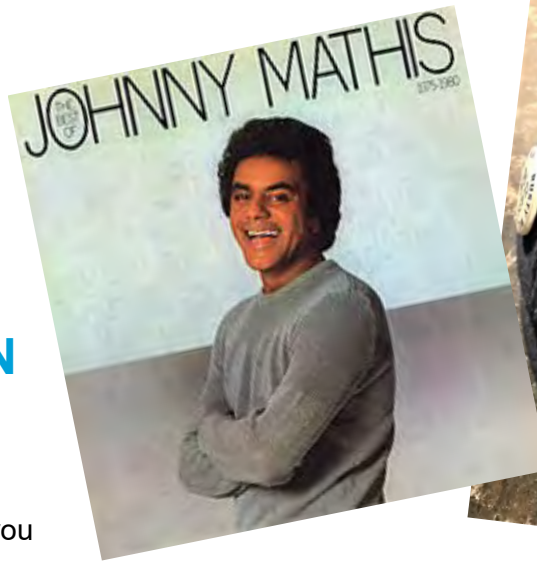
academic goals. My goal is to form a relation with student and parent(s) in order to find not just the best school but the right school for the student which will afford the student the greatest potential for success.

WHAT DOES JOHNNY MATHIS & THE INFAMOUS BEANIE CAP HAVE IN COMMON?



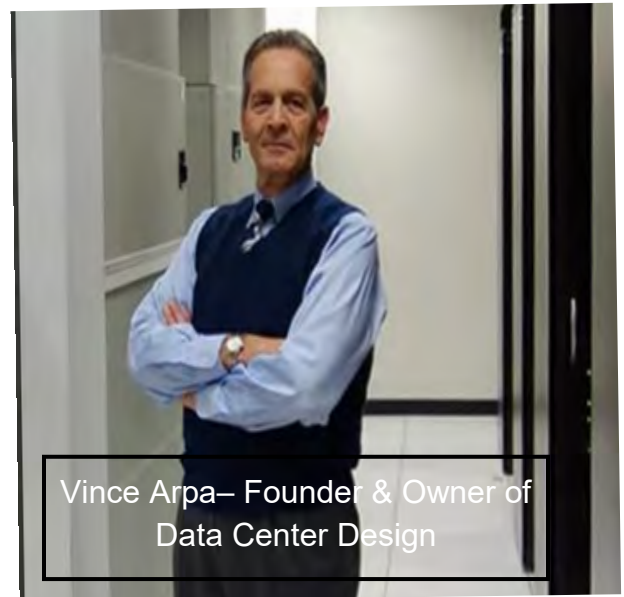

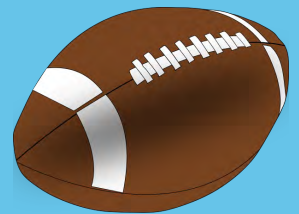
